To support you in these endeavors we encourage you to prayerfully familiarize yourself with the following opportunities, asking yourself: *What might the Spirit of Christ be saying to me as I seek to discern what the Lord is inviting me to change and/or incorporate in the daily, monthly, and yearly rhythms of my life?*

COACHING

"Coaching is not telling people what to do; it's giving them a chance to examine what they are doing in light of their intentions." ~James Flaherty

There are all kinds of good ways to describe how coaching works. One of the ways to conceptualize it is as a "laboratory" in which you—the pastor—are safe to speculate, give voice to hunches, imagine, hypothesize, develop ideas, sort out what's realistic and what might not be, reflect, explore, re-think, create and sharpen goals, and make plans to reach them. A coach's role is to ask questions, make observations (with your permission), be compassionate and curious, help you identify your main agenda (and sub-agendas), and collaborate with you to make forward movement toward realizing it.

YOU CAN DO IT

Northwest Coast Presbytery's Commission on Ministry wants to encourage pastoral leaders to construct and maintain a habitat of relationships that encourage growth, spiritual formation, leadership development, and accountability.

The commission has gathered the resources and offers these with the following expectations:

Each pastor develop a spiritual rhythm or "rule that fits them (recognizing there is no "one size fits all")

Each pastor in a one – to - one relationship with a leadership coach, spiritual director or mentor.

Each pastor involved with a group of companions in ministry who met regularly for sharing, prayer, accountability and encouragement.

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SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

Deep within we all long for a more conscious experience of God's presence and love; to attend to and notice God's action in our daily life. In spiritual direction a person who is wise and experienced in discerning the language and movements of the Spirit of Christ assists us in our prayer lives; encouraging us to open ourselves to how the Spirit is transforming what we do in the name of Jesus to what the Spirit is doing in us as we follow Jesus. A spiritual director also guides us in developing a rhythm of spiritual practices that aid us in cultivating "listening hearts" for the way in which Jesus is speaking into our every day realities.
