Presbytery of the Northwest Coast Minutes of the 25<sup>th</sup> Stated Meeting October 6, 2022

All times Pacific Daylight - Attachments are indicated by endnotes in the text

Worship preceded the meeting at 5:00 p.m. Elder Steve Kinney and Rev. Stephanie Hankey served as liturgists. The Rev. Andea Chaumont of Lake Forest Park Presbyterian Church preached a sermon entitled *The First and the Last* on Matthew 20:1-16. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated.

The meeting, held at Maplewood Presbyterian Church, Edmonds, WA, convened at 6:35 with prayer by Co-Moderator Rev. Becca Niemeyer. A quorum was present; (roll is attached.)<sup>1</sup> The agenda was approved as posted. The minutes of the previous meeting had been approved by the presbytery's standing rule and posted on the presbytery website. Guests and first time commissioners were introduced.

#### **Stated Clerk**

The Rev. Dean Strong reported the following:

**Tieton Administrative Commission** – The following were designated by the Executive Board on Sept. 15, 2022, to dissolve the congregation and corporation of Tieton Presbyterian Church, transferring all remaining property to the presbytery and authorized to execute the appropriate state and legal documents to accomplish the task: Ruling Elders Michelle Wyles & Laona Mason of Tieton; Rev. Bob Johnson, HR.

**Spring Church Administrative Commission** – Spring Church was declared an organized congregation, elders were ordained and installed, Rev. Matt McCoy was installed as Pastor, and Elder Jessie Bloss was commissioned as Commissioned Associate Pastor on June 19, 2022 by the following administrative commission: Revs. Amy Delaney, Mike Neelley and Andrea Chaumont; Ruling Elders Danielle Riley and Kevin Riley, who are dismissed with thanks.

**Rev. Rob Christ Administrative Commission** – Former Commissioned Pastor Rob Christ was ordained as a Minister of the Word and Sacrament and installed as Pastor of Edmonds Presbyterian Church on July 10, 2022, by the following administrative commission, who are dismissed with thanks: Bethany Reid, *Maplewood*, Linda K. Reynolds, *Edmonds*, Rev. Janine Moriarty, *Terrace View*, Rev. Emily Mitchell, *Calvin*, Rev. Hallack Greider, *Maplewood*.

Clallam Bay Administrative Commission – An Administrative Commission had been establish February 20, 2020, "to assume the full powers of the Clallam Bay session, half of the members (ruling or teaching elders) to be designated from other churches, and half of the members to be the elected members of the session who will serve their current terms and be reelected or replaced by the congregation's rule for electing the session." Some members of the original commission have left the presbytery; others had requested replacement. The following resolution was APPROVED, "Resolved, That the Clallam Bay AC be redesignated as follows: Rev. Carol McLaughlin, Moderator; Ruling Elders Donna Keys and Loretta Klock, and a teaching elder to be named by the presbytery moderator."

## **Executive Staff**

Acting EP Rev. Amy Delaney highlighted the ministry of the Tieton Presbyterian Church which has come to an end.

Rev. Delaney, with the Rev. Jinsuk Kim, Associate EP for Korean Ministries, recognized the ministry and work of the following members who have recently retried: Revs John Jung Il Park, *Oak Harbor Korean*, Frank Baresel, *Lake Forest Park*, Scott Anthony, *Cottage Lake*; Cody Ryu, *UPC of Seattle*.

## **Executive Presbyter Nominating Committee**

The Rev. Mark Terayama reported that the committee was interviewing final candidates.

## **GA Commissioner Reports**

Written reports<sup>2</sup> were received and reviewed from commissioners Rev. Becca Niemeyer and Elder Sam Dechter, *FPC Kennewick*; both offered additional personal comments.

## **Nominating Committee**

The Rev. Scott Anthony reported a resolution that the following be elected or reelected; terms to begin Jan. 1, 2023:

There were no nominations from the floor. The resolution to elect was APPROVED. The resulting 2023 roster of commissions, committees and officers is attached.<sup>3</sup>

#### **Executive Board**

Co-Moderator Rev. Matt Paul began the report by handing out several "Covid Awards," mugs and candy, recognizing new experiences and coping strategies people shared for surviving (and thriving) during the pandemic.

**2023 Operating Budget<sup>4</sup>.** Rev Paul reported, on behalf of the Board, the following resolution, "*Resolved,* That the 2023 budget and per capita be adopted, including a per capita apportionment of \$52.60 per member, (\$42.50 for presbytery \$0.25 for Synod, and \$9.85 for General Assembly); acknowledging that the 2024-2027 budgets in the attachment are pro forma forecasts and will be revised as needed each year." Schedules were distributed with the agenda and are attached to these minutes. Treasurer Matt Appel provided further information. The resolution was APPROVED.

**Program Calendar Year Revision.**<sup>5</sup> The Board has approved a revision to the presbytery's program calendar that will include electing officers, commission and committees in February, a retreat coinciding with a June face to face presbytery meeting, and terms beginning July 1<sup>st</sup>. Full implementation beginning in 2024 will require amending the bylaws, which will be proposed at the next presbytery meeting.

Summary of Board actions since the last meeting compiled from the minutes, which are posted online:

- Matthew Appel was hired as Budget Dir. & Treasurer, to be elected by the presbytery.
- A \$2,000 assistance grant was awarded to Collide.
- Cascade View was awarded \$7,000 to help convert the former presbytery office into transitional homeless housing.
- A church building & property in the village of Klukwan, AK, was deeded to the local tribe.
- Warren Weber inspected and reported on Alaska church property.

#### **Examinations**

The Examination Team of COM reported the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That Rev. Adam Tobey, of Utah Presbytery, be received as a member to serve in a validated ministry as Tall Timber Camp Director.

"Resolved, That Rev. Laurel Underwood, of Baltimore Presbytery, Honorably Retired, be received as a member."

The Commission on Ministry reported the following resolution, "*Resolved*, That <u>Rev. Laura Krauss</u>, of Pacific Presbytery, be received as a member to serve as interim pastor of Kunéix? Hídi Northern Light United Church"

The three candidates were welcomed by the presbytery, and each offered a brief statement of faith and of commitment to the ministry of Word and Sacrament. The examination continued on "Christian Faith and views in theology, the Bible, the Sacraments, and the government of the church." A motion to end the examination was approved and the candidates were excused to the waiting room. Motions regarding each candidate were taken up separately.

After discussion, the resolution for Rev. Adam Tobey to be received as a member was APPROVED. After discussion, the resolution for Rev. Laurel Underwood to be received as a member was APPROVED.

After discussion, the resolution for Rev. Laura Krauss to be received as a member was APPROVED.

The new members were welcomed by the presbytery with additional nonsensical and humorous personal "examination," gifts, and the laying on of hands and prayer.

## **Commission on Ministry**

Moderator Greg Lund reported the following:

**2023 COLA.** The recommended 2023 Cost of Living Adjustment for Ministers and Commissioned Pastors serving in pastoral relationships is 8.3%.

## **Delegated Actions Reported to the Presbytery**

Pastoral Relationships & Transitions sorted by congregation.

**Fruitland/Noh.** A \$600 COM grant was awarded Sept. 1st to Fruitland for a salary bonus to Pastor Noh to help the church satisfy presbyery minimum salary.

**Kunéix Hidi Northern Light.** A MIF was approved by the moderator, EP, and Stated Clerk between meetings. A fit exam was completed for Rev. Dr. Laura Krauss (PCUSA) who will begin service on September 1<sup>st</sup>; terms were approved; Rev. Krauss was examined by COM on Sept. 29 and recommended for presbytery membership.

The associate pastor position is now vacant; Rev. Kristie McGuire, UMC, was reassigned July 1st.

**North Creek/Helmcke.** The session requested "If the results of the mission study are in alignment with Kurt's long terms goals as an installed pastor for an indefinite term, that we are actually a church that Kurt continues to feel led to serve as installed pastor for an indefinite term, then we would ask that a PNC, when formed, be allowed to consider whether to do a national search or to call Kurt Helmcke directly"

Since an open search was not conducted when Rev. Helmcke was called as designated pastor amidst extraordinary circumstances, COM affirmed that constitution requires that an full open pastoral search be conducted, stating:

- a. That the session conduct a "mission study" by consulting with the congregation and the community to review and revise, if necessary, the church's mission & vision;
- b. That a PNC be elected to
  - i. Write and post the MIF on Church Leadership Connection (CLC);
  - ii. Consider responses to the MIF and nominate a pastor. "Space" needs to be created for the PNC to discern, with integrity, who God is calling to be the pastor, without prejudice; the healthiest process will include considering and interviewing other candidates in addition to the current designated pastor;
  - iii. The current designated pastor is free to apply and the PNC is free to nominate him.

**Sunnyside/Valdez.** The temporary contract was extended (9/1) through Dec. 31<sup>st</sup>. A revised MIF was approved Sept. 29th.

**Snohomish 1st/Temporary Associate Pastor.** The following was APPROVED on July 21st: "That the session FPC Snohomish be permitted to hire a temporary Associate Pastor, who may be a candidate for an installed position upon approval by COM, and a 3/4ths vote of the presbytery to establish the call."

**Wrangell/Covalt.** Commissioned Pastor Nettie Covalt was recommissioned on Sept. 1<sup>st</sup> for an additional three year term; authorized to moderate the session, administer the sacraments, and officiate at marriages; working under the supervision of Rev. Hanna Peterson Shearer, mentor and supervisor, as required by G-2.1004.

Minister Members & Commissioned Pastors, sorted by member.

**Jackson.** The ministry of Laurel Jackson as CEO of Chaplaincy Healthcare was recognized as a validated ministry beyond the jurisdiction of the church per G-2.0502.

Neason. Rev. Bobbie Neason, HR, was dismissed to Cascades Presbyery as of May 31, 2022.

**Riley.** The following was APPROVED on July 21<sup>st</sup>, "That CP Kevin Riley be permitted to officiate at a wedding outside of his commission, in Culpepper, VA, for the son of an elder at Mount Baker Presbyterian Church. (CPs must be authorized by the presbytery to officiate at weddings outside the context of their commissions)."

Smith.. Rev. Jan Smith was granted Honorably Retired status as of June 30, 2022.

**Tobey.** The ministry of Adam Tobey as Director of Tall Timber Camp was recognized as a validated ministry beyond the jurisdiction of the church per G-2.0502 on Sept. 29th.

## Congregations.

**Craig & Klawock/CREs for communion.** APPROVED July 21st: "*Resolved,* That REs Victoria Merritt and Adeline DeCastro be re-commission to preside at communion in the absence of a teaching elder for another 3 year term."

**Ketchikan.** Larry Emery was named moderator of the session on July 21<sup>st</sup>. Talks continue with the UMC church about shared ministry.

**Lake Forest Park.** The session was granted permission on Sept. 1<sup>st</sup> to call a congregational meeting to elect a pastor nominating committee.

Metlakatla. Larry Emery was named moderator of the session on July 21st.

**Petersburg/CREs for Communion**. APPROVED July 21<sup>st</sup>: "*Resolved*, That commissions for REs Charley Streuli, Sue Erickson, Jeff Erickson, Joe Teter, and Merrily Jones to preside at communion in the absence of a teaching elder be renewed for three years." A MIF was approved on Sept. 29th.

**Tieton.** The session has requested dissolution in consultation with the congregation, which held its final worship service August 28<sup>th</sup> (see Stated Clerk's report).

**Yakutat/CREs for Communion**. RE Cathy Wassillie WAS recommissioned to preside at communion in the absence of a teaching elder for another 3 year term (9/1).

## COM Administration, Strategy, Policies, & Procedures.

**Annual Reports of All Ministry Members** will open via the presbytery's website in mid October to be completed and reviewed by the end of the year.

**Exit Interviews.** Pastor Exit Interview Suggested Questions was adopted as a resource since COM now requires that all those leaving a call or the presbytery be interviewed.

*Minimum Terms of Call* was amended to include *Juneteenth* as a holiday (If the teaching elder works on a designated holiday, another day shall be scheduled within two weeks of the holiday. If a designated holiday falls on a teaching elder's normally scheduled day off, it will be observed within two days before or two days after").

**Clergy Spouse Support Group.** A self organizing group, coordinated by Carrie Hines was ENDORSED and AFFIRMED.

## **Commission on Preparation for Ministry**

Rev. Neil Trainer reported the following Delegated Actions:

Kevin Nolette & Jean Hamilton were appointed as Ordination Exam readers; Linda Colby was appointed as the alternate.

Commissioned Pastor <u>Danielle Riley</u>, of Mt. Baker PC, was enrolled as an Inquirer on Sept. 22<sup>nd</sup>. She was present and the presbyery laid hands on her and prayed for her.

Linda Erickson, of Calvin PC, was enrolled as a Candidate on Sept 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Candidate <u>Bill Whitney</u>, FPC Snohomish, appeared for an Annual Consultation on July 28<sup>th</sup>. The commission approved his continuation in the preparation for ministry process.

This was my first time serving as a commissioner to GA on behalf of the Presbytery. I grew up in a PC(USA) congregation, attended a PC(USA) seminary, and have been a PC(USA) pastor for nearly 10 years and this was by far the most Presbyterian I have ever felt in my life! I had a mixture of feelings heading into this gathering based on the variety of intel I've received over the years regarding past GA's. As you are likely well aware, this is the hub of where our governance takes place, which means many watch and comment with a myriad of opinions and critique, for better or for worse. I know these gatherings have been any number of things - divisive, unifying, invigorating, daunting, etc. I have to say, I was pleasantly surprised.

I served as a commissioner on the Race, Gender, and Justice committee. Preparation for participation started in early spring, as we got acquainted with the online database to be able to read all the documents and learn how to vote as well as submit motions. Each item for discussion includes not just the request/motion, but also the rationale, resources for further education, and commentary from various offices/committees of the Presbytery who have a stake in the outcome. It was like being in Seminary all over again! We were invited to zoom gatherings in order to get to know our fellow commissioners, and to try and set the tone for our time together. I am quite simply deeply appreciative for anyone who volunteers to be a commissioner. It is a lot of hours of preparation and involvement - prayer and education combined. I was especially thankful to those who volunteer to co-moderate these committees - ours set the tone as being a 'Brave Space' - if you are unfamiliar with the term, I encourage you to engage with the ideology. Here is a poem that is often shared which more or less highlights the ethos:

## AN INVITATION TO A BRAVE SPACE

Together we will create brave space

Because there is no such thing as a "safe space"

We exist in the real world

We all carry scars and we have all caused wounds.

In this space

We seek to turn down the volume of the outside world.

We amplify voices that fight to be heard elsewhere,

We call each other to more truth and love

we pursue honesty and truth, and commit to working together to discern God's best for our denomination. Anyone who serves on Session recognizes the brave spaces those need to be working together is HARD! So imagine expanding your Session to over 300 people...

Serving in the committee was hard work - not just the due diligence it takes to engage with the content, but implementing proper parliamentary procedure alongside the technology, speaking up in a way to be understood, listening well to really understand, having fruitful dialogue and debate around things that are rife with emotion and personal story, the list goes on. Particularly in our committee, many voiced the reality of having to pay deeper and closer attention to issues they have never had to personally engage before - it was difficult, eye opening, and healing. One of the gifts of diversity in our denomination is the exposure we give to one another to see as the kingdom of God sees - our regional, ethnic, socioeconomic, generational diversity brought together in those rooms centered around Christ really helped us bring voice to the family of God in order to see the fuller picture of what God is calling us to work towards together. It was a special blessing to serve on the committee where the Northern Light Overture was presented and participate in helping it pass.

Serving at this level is a strange work - it is governance mixed with theology. Business practicalities mixed with heartfelt conviction. Our spaces and time were intentionally peppered with prayer and time for devotional contemplation so we could do our best to discern God's guidance in every decision. We had to lean on the movement of God's Spirit to be responsible with what was before us. I know the summaries of what we receive and share with our congregations on the back end of GA are a bit dry and succinct, and likely lead your congregants to more questions and concern rather than curious conversation - the summaries don't reflect the blood, sweat and tears that accompanied the faithful journey each commissioner made to participate in making these decisions.

I was physically present during my committee meetings (so hot and sticky out in KY!), and everyone attended plenaries virtually. I was impressed by the ability of our co-moderators to listen, move us along, prayerfully focus us, and assertively handle business. I am thankful for the diligence of those in our denomination bringing to light topics that may not affect my local congregation but do have an impact on the welfare and flourishing of our brothers and sisters in Christ. I am thankful to participate in a denomination that takes issues of justice and equality seriously, who theologically discern what creation care for our world means, and are willing to wade into the complexity of divisive topics faithfully and carefully.

Please know that I am open to further conversation and dialogue to process GA with any of you - it is a unique experience and one I know not all are privy to get a chance to attend. I also realize translating the content of GA to our local communities is a hefty daunting task, and I pray for each of our church leaders - Teaching and Ruling Elders, that God would bestow wisdom, compassion, and curiosity in the conversations that flow from the decisions made this summer.

TL;DR - Working together is hard, God is good. Be a part of this craziness the next chance you get!

# The General Assembly (GA) 225 Plan

- The plan was a hybrid mix of in-person meetings and online Zoom meetings.
- All committees met in-person during the first two weeks of the assembly.
  - The 16 committees were divided into four groups of four committees each.
  - Each group of four committees met for three days in turn.
- All committee meetings were available for online viewing by noncommissioners and other interested persons.
- Only official committee members and support staff were permitted to speak, make motions, and vote.
- The opening day plenary sessions were conducted in-person in a single large meeting room.
- The initial group of four committees plus the B&O committee comprised the in-person attendees at the initial plenary sessions of Day 1. The remaining Commissioners and Delegates were able to attend via Zoom.
- The final plenary sessions with all commissioners and delegates participating met via Zoom for five days during the final week of the assembly.

# Comments on the Plan

- Committee meetings were conducted in-person, as in previous GAs, leading to energetic and productive discussion of the overtures assigned as business.
- Plenary sessions were less effective in generating discussion among participants (Remember the lengthy lines of Commissioners waving colored placards as they waited to be heard?).

- At times there were more than 500 online participants in a plenary session.
- I did not feel a sense of participation in the larger community.
- Commissioners were able to speak, make motions, etc., but only a few participated in discussing

an issue.

- There was inadequate time in the agenda for Commissioners to review items included on the Consent Agenda to determine whether to recall items for discussion in a plenary session.
- My opinion: The Day 1 opening plenary sessions meeting space was too small for the meetings – see photo.



# My Assignment

- I was assigned to the B&O (Bills and Overtures) Committee.
  - The B&O role at the GA is to manage Commissioner Resolutions, to provide oversight of committee and plenary business, to stay alert for duplicate items, to monitor the flow of business, to look for potential traffic jams, and to manage plenary time requirements.
  - Each B&O member was assigned to monitor a specific committee as a non-participant. I was assigned to monitor the work of the Mid-Councils Committee.
  - The B&O Committee was included in the opening Plenary Sessions, along with the four Group 1 committees to establish a voting quorum to conduct business, to modify the GA standing rules to permit online meetings, and to elect the new Moderator/Co-moderators.
  - The West coast B&O members then stayed on in Louisville to observe the first group of committees; others on B&O did their monitoring assignment remotely via Zoom.

- During the committee meetings, YAADs did not hesitate to participate in, and at times lead, the floor discussion of an overture.
- As in previous GAs, a few participants seemed to dominate the discussion in committee meetings and during Plenary sessions.



# **General Comments**

- For all in-person meetings, meals were provided at no cost. We had a choice of box meals with better contents than most airline offerings □. (Remember
  - the catered meals for 1500 or so persons in a large ballroom? Not this time around.)
- Mealtime breaks did provide an opportunity for small group conversation and dialog.
- During the Plenary meetings, it was very tiring to sit in front of a computer, with and without a headset, for hours and hours each day for five days in a row.

# GA Action Highlights

- Israel was declared by a wide margin to be an apartheid state based on its actions against the Palestinian people.
- Fossil Fuel Divestment: The Assembly called for divestment from five oil companies because they don't do enough to combat global warming. This topic generated less discussion/debate than divestment recommendations in previous General Assemblies.
- The OGA (Office of the General Assembly) and the PMA (Presbyterian Mission Agency) will be unified into a single agency.
- A unified Budget for OGA, PMA, and the A Corporation was established at \$88.3 million in 2023 and \$89.4 million in 2024.
- The assembly condemned the Russian Invasion of Ukraine.

- The assembly dealt at length with several Race and Gender issues.
- The 226<sup>th</sup> GA (SLC) will be flipped from GA225 in that Committee meetings will be conducted online via Zoom and the plenary sessions will be inperson meetings.
  - MY OPINION: This will not work well with the Committees meeting online. Much of the important work of the GA takes place in the committee meetings. I feel that a vital element of the GA decision making process will be lacking.

## **Presbytery Calendar/Meeting Task Force Proposal**

#### Resolved:

The presbytery meeting and nomination calendar shall be revised to a July 1 to June 30 orientation effective in 2024. The result of which will align presbytery meetings and terms of service according to the following schedule (with primary business noted):

## February (Virtual Meeting)

- Financial report of the previous calendar year is received
- Annual terms of call are reported
- Elections (Officers, Board Commissions, Committees)

Note: Terms begin for new officers, commissioners, and committee members on July 1

## June (Face-to-Face Meeting)

- Annual Statistics reported
- Number of Church Commissioners determined by statistics
- Necrology (previous calendar year)
- GA Overtures, every other year (deadline 365 days from close of GA)
- GA Overture Concurrences, every other year (one year before GA)
- GA Commissioner/YAAD Elections, every other year (one year before GA)

## October (Virtual Meeting)

- Operating Budget received and approved.
- GA Commissioner reports

If approved, the Nominating Committee will adjust terms of service for new officers, commissioners, and committee members beginning in 2023 in preparation for implementation of the new calendar in 2024.

## **Background/Rationale:**

With the move to more virtual presbytery meetings, the importance of an annual face-to-face grows. Face-to-face meetings in October are problematic due to the likelihood of inclement weather conditions for people traveling from Southeast Alaska and over the Cascade Mountain passes. The same is true for committee orientation meetings held in January. Also, October meetings come just as people are spending more time indoors, increasing the chance of viral transmission.

Under the proposed format, committee orientation meetings will be held in the days immediately preceding to the June meeting, saving the expense of additional travel for new officers, commissioners, and committee members (see notes below).

The fiscal calendar would remain the same—January 1 through December 31.

## Other Notes:

The task force proposes the following schedule for June presbytery meetings beginning in 2024:

- [Thursday noon-Friday noon, Onboarding Retreat for presbytery leaders]
- Friday evening, fellowship banquet
  - Thank-yous for people finishing their terms
  - Celebration of presbytery people/events
  - Ask Doug Bunnell to emcee!
- Saturday morning worship/meeting, finishing by noon
- Optional Saturday evening Mariners game when they are in town!

Presbytery would cover the following costs for commissioners:

- Transportation and Friday night stay
- Extra night-or perhaps two, depending on flight schedules-for Alaska commissioners

## **Proposed COM Recommendation for 2023**

Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA) of 8.3% and Merit Increases

The Commission on Ministry is recommending a 8.3 % Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for Terms of Call for 2023. A COLA is an attempt to deal honestly with the effects of inflation and price increases. The COLA recommendation is for the ordained staff, but many churches will use this rate for their non-ordained staff as well. We encourage merit salary increases where appropriate.

Regional variations in cost of living are expected. 8.3% is based on US Bureau of Labor and Statistics reporting mid-year (April) of 2022 for the Western US region where all our congregational pastors live. You may want to consult your local cost of living data to adjust the 8.3% down or up depending on how much or little the cost of living has shifted in your particular state/county. For example, the comparable number for Urban Alaska this year is 7.5%, and for the Greater Seattle urban area is 9.1%.

## COM background - How we get the numbers -:

The "cost of living" is based on the percentage increase or decrease in the consumer price index, using data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. (<a href="http://data.bls.gov">http://data.bls.gov</a>). The Commission on Ministry has historically calculated changes in the cost of living using data on the "Consumer Price Index for Urban Consumers" in the "Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue" area, the only region available for Washington State. This year the increases are significantly higher than the national and regional average (we use the April-to-April numbers). The percentage increase for the 12 months can be seen on these tables:
